# 1 Peter Study Guide

## Background

1 Peter was written by the apostle Peter, who was, according to Jesus, the rock the church was built on. (Mathew 16:18). Some modern scholars refute this, and claim that it is falsely ascribed to Peter. The reasons being either that the intelligent Greek of the letter doesn't fit a Galilean fisherman like Peter, or that the theology in the letter is closer to Paul than Peter. However, these objections do not hold much weight. Early church fathers ascribe this letter to Peter, there is significant evidence that Greek was spoken regularly in Galilee. Peter may have even used the assistance of a secretary named Silvanus in composing the letter. The letter was most likely written by Peter, in Rome, circa A.D. 62-63, before the Neronian persecution began.

## Introduction

The main themes of 1 Peter are faith and rejoicing under persecution, hope for salvation, and how we do not need earthly things because we have salvation. It was written to believers scattered throughout Asia Minor, to encourage them in times of strife. The letter can similarly encourage us in our modern culture, which is against God. When reading this letter and answering the questions, take heart. These verses can be your metaphorical sword and shield in the spiritual battles we face. Wield them with courage and faith.
